**COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course provides an introduction to the structure and function of the American legal system. Major areas of substantive law are introduced to students, including intellectual property law, family law and contract law. An overview of both civil and criminal procedure is also provided. Legal vocabulary and the process of legal analysis are emphasized.

**STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES**

After completing this course, students will have:

- Testable awareness of the structure and function of the American legal system.
- Proven mastery basic court procedures used in civil and criminal cases.
- Testable awareness of major areas of substantive law.
- Measurably improved written and verbal communication skills assessed through the legal research assignment and class participation.

**TESTING & GRADING**

There will be two in-class exams given during the semester, and each examination will be worth 20% of the final grade. Each student will also complete a legal research assignment worth 20% of the final grade. A comprehensive final examination will be given at the end of the course, constituting 30%. Additional assignments and class participation will be worth 10% of the final grade. Excessive absences from class will negatively impact a student's grade in the course.

Students will not be permitted to make-up any examination or assignment, unless they have a valid excuse approved by the professor.
